ADPP Teacher Training Program in Mozambique (including Cabo Delgado, Niassa and Chimoio)

ADPP in Mozambique implements the Teacher Training Program in 11 Teacher Training Colleges, 3 with a 3-year program and 8 with a 1-year program. The program is implemented in close coordination and agreement with the Ministry of Education and Human Development and is in line with the focus of Humana People to People to ensure that all children have access to and complete their primary education of seven years. In total the number of students enrolled in the three year program for 2018 was 646 and the 2016 team finalized their training by graduating 215 students.

In 2018 Teacher Training College Cabo Delgado, started with 64 students of the 2nd year and 60 of the 3rd year - a total of 124.

Teacher Training College Chiomoio had 264 students in 2018 and Niassa continued with its one-year curriculum.

TCE Community Testing Gaza

The project strives to ensure that community members play an active role in preventing the spread of HIV and to encourage positive living for people already infected. The project's main activities include mobilization and HIV counseling and testing and TB screening services in order to reduce new infections in 8 districts in Gaza province and ensure that the global defaulter rates per health facility covered remains low. The project contributes to the 90-90-90 UNAIDS goals through implementation of home based testing based on Index Cases. The project currently has 246 Field Officers who do the community counseling and testing in households who already have people that have tested HIV positive at the health facility (Index cases). In 2018, the project managed to test 93,365 people for HIV. The project, after intensive follow-up also managed to reintegrate 6,287 people who had abandoned treatment.

TCE Key Population Gaza, Zambezia and Niassa

In 2018 ADPP continued its commitment on the implementation of the HIV/AIDS Prevention Project among key and priority populations (sex workers and clients, regular partners, children of sex workers, adolescents and young people at risk of contracting HIV and others), commonly referred to as PASSOS.

The project has a total of 46 peer educators and 43 lay counselors. 4.748 sex workers were reached with different packages of the program. 10 savings groups were created that saved 270,287 meticais. 330 Positive living TRIOs for Female Sex Workers formed.

Malaria Prevention in Nampula and Niassa Provinces

The project is implemented in collaboration with the National Malaria Program, from the Mozambique Ministry of Health, as part of the countries effort to fight malaria. The project also trains school teachers, community activists and volunteers as malaria advocacy experts. These trained individuals will then work within their communities to transmit malaria prevention messages, mobilize anti-malaria campaigns, and undertake home visits intended to reach children, pregnant women, and the general population. The project purpose is to mobilize people to take control of Malaria by implementing malaria prevention actions in their homes and communities and by seeking early treatment of malaria infection at the health centers.

The project covers 6 districts in Niassa and 17 in Nampula.

TCE in Maputo, Gaza and Inhambane

The HIV Prevention, Gender Based Violence and Human Rights Promotion project, aims to implement a set of prevention and follow-up activities for the treatment of HIV infection, focusing on vulnerable populations: girls 10-14, young women 15-19 and 20-24 years. The project aims to contribute to reducing the incidence of HIV (new cases of infection), eliminating human rights barriers and promoting adherence to services. The project offers a wide prevention service package, including sexual and reproductive health, life skills, referral to Youth Counseling and Testing Health Services, Gender Based Violence screening, human rights, family planning, condom distribution, referral to health services for counseling, community testing and other health services. Teachers assist the Field Officers to work with the younger group (10-14yrs), while young women (15-24) will be engaged at the community by activists.

E5 Malaria Program in Manica and Tete

The E5 Malaria project comprises 5 countries within the E8 initiative: Mozambique, Zimbabwe, South Africa, Botswana and Zambia. Project activities in Mozambique take place in 4 border districts with Zimbabwe. The project's objective is to accelerate zero local transmission in the four front-line countries by 2020, by providing a platform for joint strategic programming and collaboration, and contribute to the reduction of cross-border transmission of malaria through the establishment of malaria testing, treatment and tracking. During 2018 the project managed to set up 4 malaria plus posts and tested 35,220 people for malaria; while community health workers tested 42.053.
