


About Angola

Angola is an African country with a population of about 25.7 million people (2014 census). Angola has vast mineral and petroleum reserves, and its economy was among the fastest-growing in the world in the decade after the end of the civil war in 2002. The fall in oil prices from 2014 has however caused a prolonged recession. The standard of living remains low for most of the population, and while many improvements have been made, life expectancy is among the lowest in the world, while infant mortality is among the highest.



About ADPP Angola

ADPP is an Angolan non-governmental association, which started its activities in 1986 and was officially registered with the Ministry of Justice in 1992, and with IPROCAC in 2015.

All of ADPP's activities are built on four pillars:

- The conviction that education for all is the key to development.
- A community-based perspective that seeks to empower individuals, families and communities to make positive changes in their own lives.
- A recognition of government as a key player in promoting long-term sustainable development, and close working relationships with local, provincial and national government partners.
- An integrated, holistic approach to development that applies a 'whole community' philosophy to link activities in education, health and community development in order to achieve maximum impact.

ADPP's work is financially supported by a wide variety of partners including national and local government, private companies, UN and other international organizations and overseas governments. ADPP's projects receive institutional support from relevant ministries, including the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Families and Promotion of Women and the Ministry of Agriculture, and from authorities at provincial, municipal and local level.

ADPP Angola in numbers, 2018

ADPP Angola managed 55 projects in 2018: seven in Community Development, 10 in agriculture and environment, 9 in health and 28 in education, plus Fundraising (secondhand clothes sales).

1,143 people were employed across these fields, including ADPP project support and administration staff, with a further 2,708 people volunteering, in particular in health programs.

The number of beneficiaries was one million at the education, health, agriculture and community development projects, and a further estimated two million people benefited from the sale of affordable, quality second-hand clothes.
